SECOND

- 1. Review library rules and circulation procedures, including the use of book markers and how we care for books.
- 2. Learn parts of a book.
- 3. Introduce library organization such as location of books on shelves and discuss basic information concerning the automated card catalog.
- 4. Place emphasis on Caldecott Award Books and Texas 2X2 Books.
- 5. Practice identifying story elements such as plot, setting, character development, and theme and work to understand their use in a story.
- 6. Move into chapter books.
- 7. Understand the difference between fiction and non-fiction.
- 8. Explore the common features of informational texts.

- 9. Listen to a variety of stories, poems, and texts read aloud from a variety of genres and points-of-view.
- 10. Make text-to-text, text-to self, and text-to-world connections.
- 11. Learn how to select appropriate reading material for independent reading based on reading level, interest, and purpose, and they will be encouraged to explore a variety of genres.

<u>THIRD</u>

Library Skills

- 1. Review library rules and circulation procedures, including the use of shelf markers and book care.
- 2. Study the Dewey Decimal System, including the use of alphabetization.
- 3. Review library organization and expand on the use of the automated card catalog.
- 4. Introduce and place emphasis on Newbery Award Books and Texas Bluebonnet Books.
- 5. Establish purposes for reading and listening, such as to be informed, to follow directions, and to be entertained.
- 6. Be exposed to a variety of authors, illustrators, and genres.
- 7. Understand and identify literary terms appropriate for a variety of forms and genres.
- 8. Understand story structure.
- 9. Practice identifying story elements such as plot, setting, character development, and theme and work to understand their use in a story.
- 10. Practice research skills, including the use of the card catalog to locate information and the use of indexes and tables of contents to expedite search for information.
- 11. Practice research skills correlated to classroom projects using a variety of sources.
- 12. Explain to students the definition of plagiarism and the dangers of using it.
- 13. Continue to select appropriate reading material for independent reading based on reading level, interest, and purpose, and they will be encouraged to explore a variety of genres.

<u>FOURTH</u>

- 2. Study the Dewey Decimal System.
- 3. Review library organization and expand on the use of the automated card catalog.
- 4. Continue placing emphasis on Newbery Award Books and the Texas Bluebonnet Books.
- 5. Explain library organization and the use of alphabetization by the third letter.
- 6. Discuss a variety of authors and illustrators.
- 7. Distinguish fiction from non-fiction, including fact and fantasy.
- 8. Develop vocabulary by listening to selections read aloud.

- 9. Learn how to paraphrase and summarize oral readings.
- 10. Learn to draw inferences, such as conclusions or generalizations, and support them with evidence and experience from oral readings.
- 11. Distinguish fact and opinion in various genres read aloud.
- 12. Recognize the distinguishing features of genres, including biography, historical fiction, informational books, and poetry.
- 13. Choose appropriate independent reading material from a variety of genres.

<u>FIFTH</u>

- 1. Continue building on library skills from previous grade levels.
- 2. Review library rules and circulation procedures, including the use of shelf markers and book care.

- 5. Understand and identify literary terms appropriate for a variety of literary forms.
- 6. Practice research skills correlated to classroom projects using a variety of sources, such as the use of indexes, encyclopedias, almanacs, atlases, and periodicals.
- 7. Compare sources while completing research.
- 8. Develop vocabulary by listening to selections read aloud.
- 9. Learn to paraphrase and summarize oral readings.
- 10. Make inferences, such as conclusions or generalizations, and support them with evidence and experience from oral readings.
- 11. Distinguish fact and opinion in various selections read aloud.
- 12. Recognize that authors organize information in specific ways.
- 13. Recognize the distinguishing features of genres, including biography, historical fiction, informational books, and poetry.
- 14. Placing emphasis on Newbery Award Books and the Texas Bluebonnet Books.
- 15. Be encouraged to choose appropriate independent reading material from a variety of genres.
